WORDS FROM THE PASTOR

It's already April and Lent is coming to its end - or rather, its conclusion - in Holy Week and Easter.

When Jesus said **'it is finished'** on the cross the word he used in Greek is a form of the root word 'telos,' which means more like "it is accomplished" or "it is completed," rather than "it is all done." (Think - the meal is prepared for eating rather than it is all eaten up!)

For indeed, Jesus' death on the cross was the beginning of something more than an end to it. With his death comes new life, beginning with His resurrection, as we read in 2 Corinthians 5:14ff

"For the love of Christ controls us, because we have concluded this: that one has died for all, therefore all have died; and he died for all, that those who live might no longer live for themselves but for him who for their sake died and was raised.

*From now on, therefore, we regard no one according to the flesh. Even though we once regarded Christ according to the flesh, we regard him thus no longer. **Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come.** All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation;"*

In these verses we have a good example of the paradigm of Christian life and Lutheran theology: **Law-Gospel-Challenge**. We see the **Law**, which shows us our sin, which has to be paid for by death, is paid for us by Jesus. This is the **Gospel**. But we often forget the third part of this - our response to this wonderful and salvific news. The **Challenge** here is that He now has given that ministry of reconciliation to us - meaning that we are now called to pass on that good news - the Gospel - to others.

We Lutherans remember well the first part of the most famous words in Ephesians, which start in verses 8-9:

"For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast."

But we often forget verse 10, which follows directly:

"For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them."

As we end our Lenten time of remembering our sins, let us not forget our Savior, who died for them and with that makes us a 'new creation' in Him. But let us also remember that He died for everyone's sins and He counts on us to witness to that as we follow His command to not just love God, but to love our neighbors - whomever they might be, too. We do this not just by sharing our faith, but attending to their earthly needs, too. Amen.

The Father's Heart is transitioning back to meals being served *in* their facility, rather than *from* their facility in takeout containers. Their plan is to serve meals at the tables, rather than serving from a line. This will help give more of a home feel to the meal service, rather than a cafeteria style service as in years past. Before the pandemic, Trinity has both prepared and served the meal. If you are able to help out with cooking the night before, meal prep on the day of, or delivery and serving, please contact Pat Benjamin.



At this time, the Transition Project meal prep continues, but until changes are made, we're still dropping off the food. We look forward to being able to sit down and share both the meal and fellowship with their clients.

The Outreach Committee appreciates all the food that has been dropped off to help with the meals. At this time, we have enough rice and noodles to last quite a while; please feel free to continue donating cream soups, Rotel tomatoes & chilis, and frozen meats. Non-perishable items can be left in the gray bin on the counter, and meats can be put in the freezer in the kitchen. You have been so generous in your donations to The Father's Heart and Transition Projects.

COMPASSION INTERNATIONAL - Written by Zoe Noakes – Compassion International

In early March 2020, I was on a storytelling trip to El Salvador for Compassion. One minute we were loading the van to head to a child development center, the next we were packing our bags to rush to the airport — urgently called home as COVID-19, a seemingly distant threat, suddenly became very real. In a matter of weeks, the world felt like it shut down.

Ever since, my days have been spent at home, sharing stories about how the pandemic is affecting children living in poverty. These stories (told by our incredible local photojournalists) will stay with me forever.

Yhovana’s is one of them. When COVID-19 hit Bolivia, her husband lost his job. She works at a farm. One day, desperate to feed her four children, she looked down at the bucket of chicken guts she fed to her employer’s pigs. She had no choice. “I collected the nicer intestines to bring home,” she says, “to cook and eat.” When Compassion’s local church partner heard this, they delivered groceries. Yhovana’s family didn’t just need food, but they also deserved dignity.

Another is a grandmother in Brazil. She had just been handed a basket heaving with food by our local church partner. She was all alone. Concerned, the pastor asked if she needed help to carry it. Her response brought tears to his eyes. “It would be heavier if it were empty,” she replied.

Or Tribin, a mother in Bangladesh. Even before the pandemic, she and her husband struggled to earn enough to feed their little girls. In what is the most challenging season of their lives, she says the pandemic has taught her to believe in miracles. The church keeps providing food for them at just the right time. As she puts her daughters to bed, she tells them, “God has taught us that even when times are dark, He will show us a way through the darkness.

If these stories broke my heart, others made me laugh. In the Philippines, a teenage boy rode a water buffalo with a karaoke machine blaring to spread joy and raise funds for COVID-19 patients. In El Salvador, a family coped with being cooped up at home by creating their own stationary bicycle — using their bodies. Their youngest boy, little Josue, was the wheels.

Mostly, though, I am left in awe of people’s courage, dedication, and capacity to continually pour out love upon vulnerable families. In 2020, the world shut its doors and closed its borders. Yet people like our sponsors, supporters, and church partners opened their hands and their hearts. In dozens of different languages, they said, “What do you need? We are here for you.”

In a year that many of us would like to erase, truly beautiful things happened. In the Japanese art of Kintsugi, broken pottery pieces are repaired with gold. By embracing the flaws and imperfections, it creates a stronger, more beautiful piece. 2020 was a year that often felt broken, but I saw how God filled the cracks with bright, shining gold.

TRINITY LUTHERAN CHURCH | COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES | February 23, 2022

Attendees: Brian Hawkins, Troy Palmer, Melissa Deyoe, Ronda Corless, Craig Nickles, Pastor Ted, Herb Meissel, Carolyn Stucky

Pastor opened the meeting with a prayer

Guest Presentation by Angie Stone, Ahtia Clack, and Cary Martenson about adding a contemporary worship service. This idea has already been taken to the Elders, Pastor and a survey was sent out to the church members regarding a contemporary service. The service results showed that about 60% of those that responded were interested in a contemporary service and 60% would like it to be Sunday AM after Sunday School. They have researched some other LMCS churches and outlined a service that is more casual, flows well and keeps true to our Lutheran roots. They reached out to some other growing LCMS churches to see what they are doing to grow and noted that we want to be an outreach to others and a welcoming atmosphere. Pastor is willing to be there no matter when the service is held. Praise team would move to second service and Phyllis could play some praise music on the piano in addition to the organ. Craig reported that 8 of 8 Elders agree with the contemporary service proposal but not sure about the requested time change of the first service, as it may be too early for some members. The 8:30am time may need to be adjusted slightly. Angie and Ahtia have discussed not having a bulletin but only have projection or they are willing to help with a bulletin but want to keep it very simple. Pastor suggested Angie and Ahtia talk with J. Pat and Phyllis as well. Brian noted that we need to focus not on ourselves but on who we want to reach by having a contemporary service. There was discussion about marketing the service so it is attractive to all and reaches others through the correct social media avenues. May be worth talking to some technical staff at other churches to see what they do. This was brought to council to keep council informed and to add to the agenda for the May congregation meeting. All ideas are welcome as this is all still being planned and discussed. Cary added that the focus is going to be on people that are attracted to a more contemporary service and will be less intimidating to those that are not used to coming to a church service.

The January meeting minutes were approved.

Christian Education: Carolyn Stucky (Present-No Report)
My devotions and Lenten devotions were ordered for the next quarter. VBS material has arrived and they will be discussing the material with Ann and Pastor. Carolyn is now taking care of the finances for the Christian Ed board. Melissa explained the process of how finances are handled for CE purchases. Carolyn noted that a Confirmation retreat is being discussed.

Outreach: Pastor Ted/Craig Nickles (Present-No Report)
Bingo will be Saturday February 26th at 6:30pm. The goal of outreach is to have one event per month.

AVIT: Paul Petrone (Absent-No Report)
Hourly charge for computer service at the company Jim Clack works for is \$125, J. Pat can schedule having the work previously discussed done. Equipment in crow's nest is old, Troy is going to lead an effort to get rid of the old items.

Pastor Report: Pastor Ted (Present-No Report)
Pastor wanted to follow up on having someone help us with our vision. He spoke with Pastor Linnemann who suggested

that we have someone write a letter to Pastor Linnemann or Dust Kunkel requesting them to come and help us, Pastor will write the letter. He also asked about the bylaws. Pastor Linnemann said that we can change the bylaws and submit them to the district office for approval. The Seder meal presentation will be on April 6th at the Wednesday night service. We may need to pay the presenter for the Seder meal, pay for his hotel, or he may be expecting to have a donation basket at the door. Melissa suggested that Pastor or outreach committee contact the presenter to get the details of his travel and what he expects for fees, etc.

There was discussion about the option of renting our facility to a school in the future. It was suggested that an agenda idea be added to the May meeting to discuss the property and building use and possibly having a building use committee. The congregation needs to have input. Melissa volunteered to be a contact person for questions about building use. Insurance guidelines for building use will be sent to J. Pat so if anyone requests to use the building for an event that there are clear guidelines. Council discussed that if someone requests to use the building for an event and meets all guidelines, then J. Pat can schedule the event. If an event requests alcohol, it would need to be approved by the President, Vice President or Treasurer.

Elders: Craig Nickles (Present-No Report)
Elders are meeting on Sundays after service for now. The contemporary service was presented at their meeting. Craig has been encouraging Elders to keep calling those that have not been at church.

Treasurer Report: Melissa Deyoe (Present-See Report)
For the month ending January 31, 2022, the church reports a gain from operations of \$911. For the 1 month period ending January 31, 2022, the church reports an overall gain of \$349 from operations.

Financial Secretary: Connie Adams (Absent-No Report)

Property Board: Herb Meissel (Present-No Report)
Herb noted that he has several projects for when the weather gets warmer and he will put out a notice for helpers. He will need to rent a backhoe.

The next council meeting will be on March 15, 2022 and will be at the church. Brian will do the devotion. Congregation meeting will be May 1, 2022 and any information regarding the meeting needs to be to J. Pat by April 6th. Agenda items will include bylaws, building use committee, contemporary worship service, budget update, and second term elections.

Craig closed the meeting in prayer at 8:30pm.
